1. Western Red Cedar (<i>Thuja plicata</i>)	several around pond. Cones small upright	19. Blue Spruce (<i>Picea pungens</i>)	silver foliage
2. Cherry Plum (<i>Prunus cerasifera</i> Pissardii)	early profusion of pink flowers	20. Austrian Pine (<i>Pinus nigra</i>)	many of about the same age in Grange
3. Western Hemlock (<i>Tsuga heterophylla</i>)	cones up to 2.5cm long on shoot tips	21. Monterey Cypress (<i>Cupressus macrocarpa</i>)	hard 3cm round cones with 4 to 6 scales
4. W. Red Cedar (illuminated Grange Christmas tree)	said to be tallest living English bulb-lit tree	22. Deodar Cedar (<i>Cedrus deodara</i>)	large oval upright coness
5. Yew (<i>Taxus baccata</i>)	upright form = Irish Yew var. 'Fastigiata'	23. Japanese Maple (<i>Acer palmatum</i>)	mall decorative tree with red-winged fruit
6. Monkey-Puzzle (<i>Araucaria araucana</i>)	native to Chile/Argentina	24. Silver Maple (<i>Acer saccharinum</i>)	leaf underside silver. Maple syrup sap
7. Red Oak (<i>Quercus rubra</i>)	leaves bright red for weeks in Autumn	25. Honey Locust (<i>Gleditsia triacanthos</i>)	thornless form. Late into leaf. Rare in north
8. Dawn Redwood (<i>Metasequoia glyptostroboides</i>)	deciduous conifer discovered China 1941	26. Portugal Laurel (<i>Prunus lusitanica</i>)	leaves and fruit smaller than Cherry Laurel
9. White Willow (<i>Salix alba</i>)	long thin catkins and leaf	27. Magnolia (<i>Magnolia x soulangiana</i>)	large white flowers
10. Lawson Cypress (<i>Chamaecyparis lawsoniana</i>)	many garden forms. Round 8mm cones	28. Eucalyptus or Gum Tree (<i>Eucalyptus</i> sp)	peeling fire-resistant bark
11. Holm Oak (<i>Quercus ilex</i>)	evergreen Mediterranean Oak	29. Common Lime (<i>Tilia x europaea</i>)	fragrant flowers in July. Good for bees
12. European Beech (<i>Fagus sylvatica</i>)	form 'Purpurea' has dark purple leaves	30. Walnut (<i>Juglans regia</i>)	scented leaves. Walnuts when older
13. Weeping Willow (<i>Salix x sepulcralis</i>)	thin catkins as long as leaves. From China	31. Blue Atlas Cedar (<i>Cedrus atlantica</i> 'glauca')	grows large and stately
14. Horse Chestnut types: a-red/ b-yellow/ c-white	<i>Aesculus x carnea/ flava/ hippocastanum</i>	32. Fig (<i>Ficus carica</i>)	over 50 years old. Figs ripen some years
15. New Zealand Cabbage Palm (<i>Cordyline australis</i>)	weather damaged during 2010/11 winter	33. Maidenhair Tree (<i>Ginkgo biloba</i>)	living fossil tree with herbal qualities
16. Variegated Sycamore (<i>Acer pseudoplatanus</i>)	more decorative than common form	34. Handkerchief Tree (<i>Davidia involucrata</i>)	large showy white bracts. Fruit like walnuts
17. Ornamental weeping Willow-leaved Pear	<i>Pyrus salicifolia</i> has hard roundish pears	35. Indian Bean Tree (<i>Catalpa x rubescens</i>)	a hybrid with long bean pods when mature
18. Silver Birch (<i>Betula pendula</i>)	thin pendulous catkins; silvery/pink bark	36. Judas Tree (<i>Cercis siliquastrum</i>)	pink flowers on trunk before leaves
